
# **COMMUNITY LEARN TO SAIL**

# A Personal Example from Youth Sailor to Board Member

Welcome to the Board our new member, Kate Gehrs. She is a certified Level 1 Small Boat Sailing Instructor with US Sailing and joins the Board as our Youth Racing Advisor. We are grateful and excited to have Kate join the Board. Kate brings sailing expertise and perspective from her experiences as a competitive youth sailor. Her history of learning to sail as a young girl developed into her understanding and passion for sailing education. Kate brings a personal example of youth

sailing sustainability to the Treasure Valley. Below is a

look into Kate's sailing experience.

Ahoy! My name is Kate Gehrs, and I am a SISO sailing instructor and the newest member of the SISO Board. I moved to Boise in 2019 from the east coast but grew up in Houston, TX, where I caught the sailing bug at a young age. My first sailing memory was when I was five years old, lying on my belly at the bow of a Sunfish on Galveston Bay, my mom at the helm, letting the waves splash over my head. By the next summer, at age six, I was racing my own sailboat!

As a young kid, sailing made me feel strong and independent. On land, I was responsible for rigging and maintaining my own boat. Then on water, I was free! I learned how to make my own decisions based on the wind and waves; how to strategize and navigate a fleet of 100+ other young sailors; how to respect my own boat and other boats around me; and most of all, how to enjoy friendly competition.

I qualified to join the US Sailing Optimist National Team at age thirteen, opening many new doors to the sailing world. I met new teammates from around the country and had the opportunity to travel across the US and even to Nieuwpoort, Belgium, to represent the United States at the Flanders Youth Regatta on the North Sea. Racing against other youth from different nationalities in a foreign country, without my parents, was one of my most impactful childhood experiences. Talk about a confidence boost!

When I grew out of the Optimist dinghy at age fifteen, I started racing in the doublehanded 420 and singlehanded Laser Radial. While the competition was always fierce, sailing became more about friendships. My best friends were traveling and racing regattas right there with me. Around this time, I came to appreciate the balance between the chit-chat that occurs on land and the tranquility and silence involved in sailing a boat by yourself. Sailing can be a great time to practice concentration and reflection, whether the wind is blowing 2 knots or 20 knots.

One of the best parts of sailing is that it truly is a lifetime sport. I took a break from sailing when I attended college, and it wasn't until over a decade later, when I moved to Boise, not knowing a soul, that I found sailing again. I googled "Idaho Sailing," and SISO's sister organization Southern Idaho Sailing Association, popped up. As many know, sailors are among the friendliest people you will ever meet. The Idaho sailing community welcomed me

with open arms, and I could not be more

grateful!

As a mom of a two-year-old and a 5-month-old, I don't get out on the water as often as I would like, but I still feel like a kid every time I get the chance to sail! I always look forward to the thrill of going fast, the friendly competition, and the opportunity for reflection. Most of all, I look forward to the days when my kids participate in the SISO sailing camps, catch that same sailing bug, and discover all the adventures it can bring.

### True Story

# A Rabbit Fell Out of the Sky

In early 2022, our Chase Boat Challenge fundraising effort was successful, and we were in hot pursuit of a Boston Whaler Montauk 150 (later AKA Doris D). Alarmingly, we discovered that only two of these boats existed west of the Mississippi River! They were both held by Trudeau's Marine, the Boston Whaler Dealer in Spokane.

Gary Trudeau explained both Whalers were similarly equipped. One was white, the other blue. The SISO Board, realizing the shortage and urgency, approved an immediate deposit on the white one. Upon our calling the dealer to confirm a SISO purchase, Gary said, "Well, you'll have to take the blue one because a guy from Montana just bought the white one." He went on, "And, he says he knows you guys and your sailing club, SISA. His name is Marc Welt."



Wow. Small world for sailors in the mountains! Indeed, Marc had been a SISO supporter and was known by several board members. We began communications on aspects of new Whaler ownership; engine break-in, trailering hardware, bimini and covers, etc. Trading info with Marc helped us dial in the Doris D with confidence in short order, and the boat performed incredibly well in its first season of service.

Flash forward to January 2023. The SISO piggy bank still had funds from the first chase boat campaign, with enough additional donations from our generous supporters that we could afford another chase boat. We were committed to the second Whaler for all the same reasons as the first; safety, access to the students and dependability. It would be tight, but the Board approved the purchase of another Montauk 150 on January 21, 2023. Again, it was through Trudeau, as part of his 2023 allotment. Supposed to arrive in April or May, just in time. Lots of coordination began; confirming a blue color to match Doris D, prop guard, propeller pitch, bimini, rails, etc. Extremely exciting and another significant step for SISO.

Like sailing on a mountain lake, the wind shifted abruptly just two weeks later. On February 4, SISO received in the mail an official notice from a Boise law firm entitled INFORMATION TO HEIRS AND DEVISEES, IN THE MATTER OF THE ESTATE OF MARVIN CLEMENT WELT, aka MARC WELT, PhD.

Deeply saddened to learn of Marc's unexpected passing, we waited for more information as to what the notice would lead to next. Our networking with other SISA members and Marc's siblings revealed a very interesting profile of Marc.

His PhD was in fish biology, a field in which he had been professionally published. He traveled extensively, including to Antarctica and several trips to the Galapagos Islands. Never married and having no children, Marc had time for boat projects, and there were many over many years including power boats, sailboats, and dozens of kayaks. Most of his youth was spent living at Taliesin West, Frank Lloyd Wright's home and school for architects outside Phoenix, where Marc's stepdad was curator for over 40 years.

Marc passed due to an aggressive bone cancer. His wish was to have his remains distributed 'amongst the fish in the Galapagos Islands', provisions for which were made in his will.

And, particularly noteworthy, Marc's nickname was Rabbit.

Soon, SISO was informed of the specifics of what Marc bequeathed us through his will. Title to his new Boston Whaler Montauk 150 that we had purchased a week apart, and a 1999 Seward 25 sailboat. The Whaler has less than one hour on the engine.

These gifts represent the largest single donation to SISO to date. While we will always be donor supported, we are beginning to be financially prepared to face equipment repairs and replacements, and even take on additional aspects of sailing instruction such as adult or adaptive sailing, both requiring different types of boats. We are hugely grateful.

Finally, the obvious name for our new boat is fittingly RABBIT, a tribute to Marc and a reminder of his life and commitment to the advancement of youth sailing. Thank you, Rabbit.





### **Grant Awarded!**

In February, SISO was Awarded a \$1,000 "Grow Boating" grant from the Northwest Marine Trade Association based in Seattle.

### Nautical Knowledge: "Bluenose"

Bluenose was a fishing and racing gaff rig schooner built in 1921 in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, Canada. A celebrated racing ship and fishing vessel, Bluenose under the command of Angus Walters, became a provincial icon for Nova Scotia and an important Canadian symbol in the 1930s, serving as a working vessel until she was wrecked in 1946. Nicknamed the "Queen of the North Atlantic", she was later commemorated by a replica, Bluenose II, built in 1963. The name Bluenose originated as a nickname for Nova Scotians from as early as the late 18th century.

After a season fishing on the Grand Banks of Newfoundland, Bluenose set out to take part in her first International Fisherman's Cup. The International Fisherman's Cup was awarded to the fastest fishing schooner that worked in the North Atlantic deep sea fishing industry.

Bluenose International Fisherman's Cup Race History:

1921:Defeated American challenger Elsie

1922: Defeated the American challenger Henry S. Ford

1923: Tied the American challenger Columbia

1926: Defeated Canadian Challenger Haligonian

1930: Lost to American Challenger Gertrude L. Thebaud

1931: Defeated American Challenger Gertrude L. Thebaud

1938: Defeated American Challenger Gertrude L. Thebaud
